Cycling in Chicago by Chris McAuliffe


CHICAGO, ILLINOIS

In the late 19th and early 20th century, Chicago was the center of bicycle manufacturing in the United States. As an early industrial and transportation center, two-thirds of all bicycles manufactured in the United States were from Chicago—it was the Detroit of bike manufacturing. For decades, Chicago was also a center for cycling track and road racing. Six-day races drew capacity crowds at the Chicago Stadium, Chicago Coliseum and International Amphitheatre. Road and track competitions were also held at Sherman Park, the Humboldt Park Velodrome, and on Chicago's famed Magnificent Mile. Today, Chicago is a hub for recreational cyclists. Hundreds of miles of bike lanes, rail to trails, and bike paths, such as the Illinois Prairite Path, the Bloomingdale Trail, Lakefront Path, and the Big Marsh, provide cyclists with numerous recreational and commuting options in a crowded urban environment. In 2016, Chicago was awarded *Bicycling Magzine's* Best Bike City of 2016.

Chris McAuliffe is a longtime Chicago-area cyclist who competes in road and cyclocross racing. Chris holds a USA Cycling racing license and races for the XXX Racing-Athletico cycling team. He also enjoys recreational cycling and exploring the many bike trails and forest preserves around Chicagoland.

Early Days 1890-1910


- 1890's: 50+ Cycling Clubs in Chicago/10,000 members
- \$75 bike in 1890's or \$2,000 in today's dollars
- Mass production meant lower prices
- Chicago was the "Detroit of bike manufacturing"
- Chicago had infrastructure, capital and entrepreneurial spirit (post -Chicago Fire)






- Century of Progress/World's Fair in 1933 and 1934 showcased Chicago's manufacturing strength and energy.

- Torn down in 1962




 1897 Chicago Road Race. (Michigan Avenue to Pullman neighborhood).


III Pan American Games - 1959




The release of 5,000 doves into the air, heralds the oath of good sportsmanship in Soldier Field, Chicago, site of the 3rd Pan-American Games.



Mr. Schwinn is one of the prominent figures of the motorcycle world not merely through his position as head of a powerful organization but through his long connection with the motorcycle and bicycle business which dates back over 25 years.


Starting practically at the bottom he finally became and remains today the producer of the greatest annual output of motorcycles and bicycles of any manufacturer in the world. Late in 1911 he became the owner of the Excelsion Company which has steadily grown to its present great proportions. As we are on a tour of inspection, we are introduced to his son, Frank W. Schwinn, who is a genial fellow, and though little past his majority is Vice President of the Company and Factory Manager. Frank is a Chip of the Old Block and will some day occupy the President's Chair.








